

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
Intension and Extension

Meaning and Reference

In defining general terms, logicians are careful to distinguish between the extension of a term (which is the collection of objects to which a term applies) and its intension (or the shared attributes of those objects). Though the extension of a term is determined by its intension, the opposite is not true. Moreover, when attributes are added to the intension of a term, the intension increases—though the opposite is true of the extension. Terms may, therefore, have intension but no extension.




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A Simple Model


- The world is made up of things—objects, properties, actions, fantasies, parts and sets of other things

Ostensive Definition

Defining a term by pointing to a exemplary or paradigmatic referent. I say to my Spanish friend, "What is a 'lápiz'?"; he points to a pencil and says, "lápiz." That would be an ostensive definition of 'lápiz'.




The Semiotic Grid





Learning from ostensive definition

Someone coming into a strange country will sometimes learn the language of the inhabitants from ostensive definitions that they give him; and he will often have to 'guess' the meaning of these definitions; and will guess sometimes right, sometimes wrong

Augustine describes the learning of human language as if the child came into a strange country and did not understand the language of the country; that is, as if it already had a language, only not this one. Or again: as if the child could already think, only not yet speak. And "think" would here mean something like "talk to itself".
